So...What's Next?

It is hard to believe we have been 'outside' the church building for nearly six months! How much longer? In Pastor Rich's Sunday devotional he talked about the Holy Spirit giving us patience. The Gospel readings from Matthew during these last few weeks have been reminding us that 'being' the church does not require a building. But, yes, it is missed.

We want to share with you the data gathering and processing the Church Council via the Executive Committee goes through to determine when the church building can safely open. As you may remember, we created and adopted a plan at the encouragement of the Synod and the Churchwide Office. The ELCA is taking the safety of God's people seriously. That is difficult when our regional area has so many different denominations and churches. "If they can, why can't we?" The data collected by Pastor Rich is reviewed every two weeks. We have included his most recent report inside this newsletter. Please take a look.

As you can see, the number of cases has been increasing. We are looking at trying something new in a couple of weeks. Most of our sister churches are providing a virtual or streaming service. Those who have opened their doors have found that many do not come, so they are still sending the service out virtually. We are exploring the use of ZOOM. ZOOM would allow us all to see each other on a computer screen. If we think it will work, we will send out instructions, and a date and time. We will be discussing it at our September Church Council ZOOM meeting on September 20th. Meanwhile we will still be emailing Pastor Rich's weekly devotions.

When we finally worship together, please remember it will be different, just like all our other daily outings have changed. To start, we will ask everyone to wear a mask, we will not sing, we will not use paper or the hymnals. There will not be communion or fellowship. We know this sounds drastic, but it is our love of neighbor that keeps us cautious and everyone safe.

From Pastor Rich's September 6th Devotions:

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Today we are called to community. Jesus says, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them" (Matt. 18:20). In these Sundays after Pentecost, we are repeatedly reminded that God has not abandoned us and that Christ's resurrection and ascension are a beginning for us, not an end.

In this time of pandemic, as impatience and frustrations grow each day, the questions that follows are, "How do we be community right now? How are we gathered when we can't gather?"

The readings this week focus on the practical work of the gathered Christian community: turning from sin to repentance, from conflict to reconciliation. These are things we can do even without being physically gathered at 3100 North Saint Louis Avenue in Joplin. Indeed, these are things perhaps best achieved outside that building – like we are now. Certainly, they are things in which God is with us no matter where and how we connect with this world.

Maybe it helps to remembers this: When the church does gather as God's assembly, we do not gather as a social club, drawn and kept together only by shared demographics and interests. We are more than like-minded individuals living in the same neighborhood or sharing a similar age or background or status. If church is only a social club, then there is no reason to continue to gather when conflict arises, when uncomfortable issues are raised, or when "the way it's always been" begins to change. If church is only a social club, there is no reason to journey with God through the wilderness and do the hard work of reconciliation and forgiveness and being led to new life.

God calls us into community knowing that being in community is hard. And, in these days right now, it's especially hard. Your church council, the synod council, and the bishop recognize and struggle themselves with that each week and each day. If you are feeling challenged in this time, know that you are not alone!

Scripture brings us practical guidance for gathering through good and hard times. The Holy Spirit is always at work—in, through, and among us—to gather and regather us anew. Right now, that same Spirit is with and within you. Listen for the patience the Spirit is bringing to you. Anticipate the community that God is even now creating anew. Hold fast to the call to love your neighbor. Let these words of worship and liturgy that we share right now be our connection. Through God's Word, we are always two and three and more. We are never alone. We are God's gathered children.



Pastor Rich's COVID report from September 4th:

As anticipated, the COVID-19 news for our region continues to worsen. With todays reported numbers (excluding City of Joplin, which gets reported the following morning), we are seeing new records for risk scores in several key counties: Jasper, Ottawa, Cherokee, and Crawford.

Joplin, separately from Jasper County, is also setting a new record of risk each day. Crawford County, home to Pittsburgh State, is currently at the top of the risk levels as more than 100 students are isolated, another 600 are quarantined (as of Wednesday), and all students are being strongly encouraged to stay in place over the holiday weekend and not travel home. Current numbers indicate that Joplin may be only about 5 days behind Pittsburgh in reaching similar levels of risk. Let us pray that the trending pattern breaks before that happens because these are not just numbers — there is a real person, a child of God, associated with each and every count and a life being impacted (both now and into the future) in ways that we can only imagine.


Here is the table of daily risk scores for our region as a whole and each separate area over the past 2 weeks (Joplin's 35.12 score for today is not yet final and will go up):

Note: the cutoff score for a "red" rating is 25.0. The Harvard Global Institute for Health interprets red as being a "tipping point" condition and recommend stay-at-home orders be implemented in order to mitigate and suppress the spread of this disease.

And here is the graph of daily counts and 7-day moving averages since the first reported case in our region back in March.



As you can see, we are approaching infection rates that nearly match the severe June outbreaks in McDonald and Crawford Counties. This time, though, the center is much more within our higher population centers.

Please keep praying, but also let your prayers inform you actions. Model good practices when you are out: wear a face covering even if others are not. Encourage others to do the same where and when you can. In doing this, we do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with our God while also demonstrating our value of community responsibility.

Matthew 21:18-22

The power of prayer

[Jesus said,] "Whatever you ask for in prayer with faith, you will receive." (v. 22)

This account of Jesus cursing the fig tree seems totally out of character. Throughout the New Testament, Jesus uses his power to benefit, not to destroy. So what's going on here? Some scholars say the fig tree, for Jesus, symbolized the temple leadership. Both were intended to nourish, to comfort, and to bring peace to God's people. Both had failed.

In the unexpected ending of this story, Jesus says that his power to make the fig tree wither is nothing compared to the power of prayer. His far-fetched example of asking for a mountain to be moved invites us to pray even for what, to us, seems impossible.

Our prayer requests can include healing for those who are ill, hope for those in despair, peace in our world, and more.

Jesus, I ask for your help to live a fruitful life, and to be faithful—and even bold—in prayer. Amen.

Friends,

Imagine you're home and you hear a knock at the door. An official tells you to pack your essentials and evacuate, as a wildfire is speeding toward you. This is the situation many of our neighbors in the western part of the country are facing right now.

Fueled by a heat wave and unfavorable winds, devastating wildfires are raging across California, Oregon, Washington and other western states. At least 20 people have died, hundreds of thousands of people are under evacuation orders and more than 3.5 million acres have burned across the three states. Some evacuees face the difficult decision of whether to stay in a shelter during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Lutheran Disaster Response is engaging with at least three Lutheran social services agencies and five synods to assess the situation and determine the best ways to respond. We expect immediate needs may include food and other necessities, as well as emotional and spiritual care for those who have been traumatized.

Your gifts will support wildfire survivors. Gifts to "U.S. wildfires" will be used in full (100%) to assist those affected by wildfires until the response is complete.

Even as we face multiple crises, together we can reflect Christ's light and hope to our neighbors in their time of need.

Call to Order: Patty Heagel called the meeting to order to discuss status on reopening of the church. Coleen led the group in prayer.

Reopening: Pastor shared his ongoing monitoring of statistics in the area. Statistics show continuing rise in COVID-19 cases and our area is still in the red indicating need for social distancing, mask wearing, hand washing, and stay at home if possible.

Feedback taken from the congregation indicated mix on opening vs. staying as we have been doing. Pastor shared if we did reopen there would be no singing, no communion and no sharing of the lectern area. He did suggest that maybe we could try to do a Zoom worship service. There are only a few members without internet capability. Patty said we could see if the Synod still is offering the Zoom meeting capability.

Options can be explored.

It was agreed that at the next Council meeting, September 20, we would make plans to set up a Zoom Worship Service where everyone could see each other and give it a try. We would need to touch base with Vicky on the time since she is still doing another church. No further business and meeting adjourned.
