Let Us Hear God's Word

A reading from First Kings:

⁹At [Horeb, the mount of God,][Elijah] came to a cave, and spent the night there.

Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" ¹⁰He answered, "I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away."

¹¹He said, "Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by." Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; ¹²and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. ¹³When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. Then there came a voice to him that said, "What are you doing here,

Elijah?" ¹⁴He answered, "I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away." ¹⁵Then the Lord said to him, "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as king over Aram. ¹⁶Also you shall anoint Jehu son of Nimshi as king over Israel; and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abelmeholah as prophet in your place. ¹⁷Whoever escapes from the sword of Hazael, Jehu shall kill; and whoever escapes from the sword of Jehu, Elisha shall kill. ¹⁸Yet I will leave seven thousand in Israel, all the knees that have not bowed to Baal, and every mouth that has not kissed him." (1 Kings 19)

²²[Jesus] made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side [of the Sea of Galilee], while he dismissed the crowds. ²³And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, ²⁴but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. ²⁵And early in the morning he came walking toward them on the sea. ²⁶But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. ²⁷But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid."

²⁸Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." ²⁹He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. ³⁰But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" ³¹Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" ³²When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. ³³And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

Reflection on the Readings

In the story from First Kings, Elijah is in trouble, threatened with death. From Matthew, we hear that Peter is in trouble too, drowning in the chaos of the sea. Let these stories reflect our times. We and all our world also know the threat of death and chaos. But then, listen.

God comes to Elijah not in wind, earthquake, or fire. Rather, God comes in the sound of sheer silence and in a voice that gives him a mission. Such sounds may be little in the world, but they are the very presence of God.

And Jesus comes to Peter and the storm-tossed disciples with a word of comfort, "It is I; do not be afraid." It is I—here I am. Christ comes as the very presence of God, the one named "I AM" in the scripture. This life-giving word from God is not far away, but here, now, in this time of prayer, on our lips and in our hearts.

With the Psalmist, let us say, "I will listen to what the Lord God is saying." God in Christ is speaking peace to us right now. Then let us undertake the mission to speak that peace also to our neighbors.

A moment for silence.

Gently adapted from the poem "Under cover" by Luci Shaw:

We see God in the shape God shows to us. For some, fire. For others, holy smoke, oil, a running river, sheep's crook, muscular right arm that holds against the dark, the dread.

It is the oddity of poets to not see the world straight on but at some slant, under the skin, behind the scrim—a scurry of leaves, clouds. God speaks God's presence in the wind.

Elijah sensed God in the silence. I sensed God even in the ink warming within the pen before these words arrived.
